

TRANSFORMING MEXICANTOWN-HUBBARD'S MAIN STREET



Stakeholders actively participated during the community meetings for the Bagley Avenue and West Vernor streetscape projects. Both projects include enhanced lighting, and Bagley Avenue will also incorporate brick pavers, plantings, and decorations.



"Finding Your Way to Mexicantown," a proposal to design and implement multilingual wayfinding (a top priority for Mexicantown), is one of the 12 semi-finalists of the FORD City:One Michigan Central Station Challenge.



Two Mexicantown businesses were awarded Façade Improvement Matching Grants, which included financial incentives, architectural design services, and technical assistance to improve their commercial storefronts.






